1 Introduction

The last England-wide survey of women's experiences of maternity care was carried out in 2017. Over 18,000 women from 130 NHS trusts in England responded to the survey between April and August 2017, a response rate of 37%. Similar surveys were carried out in 2007, 2010, 2013 and 2015.

The Maternity Survey will again be undertaken in 2018 as part of the NHS Patient Survey Programme (NPSP). The survey will provide trusts with information on patient experience during antenatal care, labour and birth, and postnatal care, to facilitate targeted quality improvement. The Care Quality Commission (CQC) will use the data in their regulation, monitoring and inspection of acute NHS trusts in England, while NHS England and the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) will also use the results in measuring performance against a range of indicators and objectives.

The survey methodology follows that of previous years: paper self-completion questionnaires will be sent to eligible mothers, defined as women who had a live birth in January or February 2018 and were aged 16 or over at the time of delivery. Women who give birth in a hospital, birth centre, maternity unit, or at home are eligible. In preparation for the 2018 survey, some changes have been made to the format and content of the questionnaire and covering letters in response to stakeholder feedback, policy, analysis of the 2017 final data and cognitive interviewing. Changes have also been made to the instruction manuals and sample declaration form for the survey. This report details these changes.

Summary of development

Consultation was undertaken in order to update the 2017 questionnaire for 2018. Amendments were made on the basis of the following:

- Analysis of the 2017 survey data to examine item non-response rates, ceiling and floor effects, trust-level minimum response numbers, and correlations between question scores.
- Consultation with stakeholders including CQC, NHS England (NHSE) and DHSC regarding the scope of the survey and to take account of policy priorities.

The amended questionnaire underwent thorough cognitive interviewing with 25 women who had given birth within the previous year, as described in the next section. Based on findings from cognitive interviewing, one new question was added to the 2018 questionnaire, one question was removed, and several changes were made to existing questions, response options and instructions/notes.

Any questions in the 2018 core questionnaire not mentioned in this report can be assumed to have been carried over from the 2017 questionnaire unchanged. A summary of questionnaire changes from 2017 to 2018 can be found in the Appendix of this report. The finalised 2018 questionnaire will be published on the NHS Surveys website around March/April 2018 following ethical approval of the survey.

Cognitive interviewing

As is common practice in the NPSP, the revision and redevelopment of all questionnaires follows best practice. All question changes, regardless of how minor, are cognitively tested with recent patients. Cognitive interviewing is a research method which tests new questions and questions used in previous years to check if they are interpreted and understood as intended by respondents. It also tests whether respondents are able to answer questions appropriately with the response options provided.

Respondents for the 2018 cognitive interviewing were recruited via an advertisement on the Picker twitter page, which was subsequently shared through mother and baby groups on Facebook. In total 25 respondents were recruited: 13 testing one version of the questionnaire, and 12 testing the other version. Respondents represented women from varied demographic, geographic and patient experience profiles:

- Age range: 25 to 42 years of age.
- Geographic locations: Oxfordshire, Berkshire, Hampshire, Lincolnshire, and East Yorkshire.
- Ethnic backgrounds: White British, White American, and Asian.

The questionnaire was tested during December 2017 and January 2018. Three waves of cognitive interviews were completed. After each wave findings were analysed and, where necessary, changes were made and tested in the subsequent wave of interviews.

Upon completion of cognitive interviewing, the questionnaire was submitted for ethical approval alongside the other patient-facing materials.

2 New items added to the questionnaire

The 2018 Maternity questionnaire has been kept as similar as possible to the 2017 version to allow for year-to-year comparisons. Following consultation with the CQC and NHSE, one new question has been added to the 2018 questionnaire. This new question aims to assess continuity of care across the maternity care pathway. The question builds on the information captured in question C13 from the 2017 questionnaire, which focuses on continuity of care between the antenatal and the labour and birth stages, but does not assess the extent to which midwives involved in postnatal care are also involved in earlier stages.

Two versions of the new question were developed and then tested in two otherwise identical questionnaires, version A (see <u>Section 5</u>) and version B. The version B question is shown below.

Version B tested well during cognitive interviews, with women easily comprehending and answering the new question. Respondents could easily recall each stage of pregnancy as well as the midwives involved in their care during each of these stages.

It was decided that version B of the question would be included in the final version of the questionnaire. This version offers two advantages over version A. Firstly, version B was distinct enough from a similar continuity of care question (C13) that it did not cause confusion among respondents, unlike version A. Secondly, version B provides more information, with a greater range of options relating to pregnancy care timeframes. See Section 5 for further details about version A.

3 Changes to existing items

The wording of some questions, response options and information notes were altered to change the focus of questions, improve patient comprehension, or provide more inclusive response options. These changes are detailed below, with deletions struck through and additions underlined. Question numbers refer to items' current positions in the 2018 questionnaire.

During round one of cognitive interviewing, two women answered this question based on their booking appointment. It was decided to embolden "first" to make it clearer that this question specifically refers to the first time a health professional was seen in relation to pregnancy.

The "or" in response option 2 was replaced with a forward slash to improve consistency across the questionnaire.

Antenatal note

A 'check-up' is any contact with a doctor or midwife to check the progress of your pregnancy. It usually includes having your blood pressure and urine checked.

Please ignore other appointments that <u>did not</u> include these things, such as a visit to the hospital for a scan or a blood test only.

It was found during cognitive interviewing that women sometimes skipped this information note, and some were later confused by the word 'antenatal' and the time frame to refer to when answering questions. Therefore, the border around the note was removed and the text colour was changed from black to purple¹ in order to draw attention to the information. The last sentence was also placed on a separate line (instead of being in italics) for greater ease of reading.

The entire note has also been emboldened. However, this means that the emphasis on the words 'did not' in the final sentence, which were bold in 2017, has been lost. Therefore, these words have been underlined in the 2018 questionnaire to add emphasis.

Although this question relates to the antenatal stage, it formerly appeared in the postnatal section of the questionnaire (Section E: 'Feeding your baby'). Two women in round one of interviewing answered this question in relation to postnatal care. One woman spoke of getting information on feeding which took her baby's jaundice into account, and as such was again referring to the postnatal period.

The placement of this question also caused confusion for women who had to jump from antenatal to postnatal experiences within the same section. Some women asked for the timeframe which later questions were referring to. This out of context timeframe also impacted on the interpretation of other questions in section E.

¹ For consistency, all other notes and instructions in the questionnaire were also changed from black/red to purple in colour. Purple instructions proved successful in the 2017 Community Mental Health Survey pilot work via increased response rates both overall and by key demographic groups.

Taking all of these findings into account, there was strong evidence to suggest that the question should be moved to a more suitable section. In the final version of the 2018 questionnaire this question appears at the end of Section B which relates to antenatal care.

Section C note

Note: If you had a planned caesarean, or did not have a labour, please go to Question C7.

The phrase "or did not have a labour" was added to this question following feedback from one woman during cognitive interviewing who delivered via emergency caesarean without having a labour. The word "note" was also removed.

The inclusion of "or did not have a labour" confused one woman in round 2 of cognitive interviewing. However, further investigation found that in 2015 and 2017 approximately 15% of respondents to the Maternity Survey gave birth via emergency caesarean. It was therefore decided to keep the new phrase in order to cater to these women.

To eliminate awkward phrasing, answer option 2 was changed from "In a water / birthing pool" to "Water / birthing pool". During round two of cognitive interviewing, three women based in Hull noted that response option 4 may be outdated, as the term 'mask' is no longer in use (it is now referred to as a 'mouthpiece'). However this was not highlighted by any other women during interviewing, so may be due to regional variation. As the question was well understood and answered, it was decided to keep response option 4 unchanged for 2018 and review terms again next year.

In all three rounds of interviewing there were women who felt that this question did not include a response option to appropriately reflect their experience. In round one a respondent's husband was unable to attend the birth for medical reasons. Another woman said her husband could not be involved as much as she would have liked because of the limitations of the setting (operating theatre). Yet another woman expressed that her husband had wanted to be present during birth and labour, but the baby was born so quickly that he did not make it to the hospital in time. This woman selected response option 5 which did not accurately represent her situation.

Based on these findings, "could not be involved" was added to response option 4 following round one of cognitive interviewing, in order to more appropriately capture the experiences of women such as the above. In addition, "I did not have a partner or a companion with me" was changed to "I did not have a partner / companion with me" for continuity in the use of "/" across the questionnaire.

The "or" in response option 3 was replaced with a forward slash, similar to questions B4 and C1 above.

The "and" in this note was underlined for emphasis, to avoid women who have had a home birth but did go to hospital from skipping ahead to E1. The word "note" was also removed as it was considered unnecessary.

During round one of cognitive interviewing a respondent commented that the question marks after each response option looked odd. Although the question marks did not appear to negatively impact understanding or ease of response, it was decided to remove them as they were unnecessary. They were removed after round one of cognitive interviewing and the question tested well in subsequent rounds.

The "or" in response option 5 was replaced by a forward slash for consistency reasons.

Section E note

This section covers any advice or support given after the birth, this could be at hospital or at home.

As mentioned previously in this report, one antenatal question from Section E has been moved to Section B. This means that the remaining questions in Section E focus on postnatal care. The note above was therefore added to signpost the stage of pregnancy that Section E refers to.

The words "after you went home" in this question were emboldened following round three of cognitive interviewing. In round two, one woman said that she had seen a midwife once at home and once in hospital. Although she selected response option 1 (which was an accurate response), her comments suggested that she was not only thinking of midwives she saw at home, contrary to what is being asked in the question. During the final round of interviewing, one woman suggested that we highlight "after you went home". Based on the feedback from these two women it was decided to embolden "after you went home" to draw participants' attention to this element of the question.

For consistency reasons, the note directly above F6 was also changed from black to purple and the italicisation was removed.

During the second round of cognitive interviewing one woman said she had let her doctor know that she did not want or need contraceptive advice. She therefore was not able to select a suitable option for this question and skipped it. Following round two, response 3 "I did not want / need any advice" was added and caused no problems in the final round of interviewing.

Section G note

Please complete as many of these questions as you can. Your answers will help us to describe the women taking part in the survey and to find out whether the care offered to women is the same regardless of their background or circumstances.

To improve consistency across the questionnaire, the note at the beginning of Section G was emboldened and changed from black to purple.

Section H note

Please note that the comments you provide in the box below will be looked at in full by the NHS Trust, the Care Quality Commission and researchers analysing the data. We will remove any information that could identify you before publishing any of your feedback.

The words "in the box below" were removed to reflect the reality that a comment made at any point in the questionnaire can be looked at in full by CQC or the trust.

4 Items removed from the questionnaire

One question was removed from the 2018 questionnaire, as shown below.

This question was removed in order to create space for the new question addressing continuity of care, F12 (see Section 2).

Following analysis of 2017 data, seven questions were highlighted as potentials for removal. Of these seven, the question above was selected for removal because it is not a scored question, meaning it has no impact on trust scores and is not used within any NHS performance indicators. Additionally, as E3 is a filtered question, most respondents skip past it when filling out the questionnaire. In 2017, 85 of the 130 trusts who took part in the survey had data suppressed for this question because too few women at their trust answered it. As such, the question does not provide useful information for many trusts.

5 Items tested but not included

There were four amendments and one new question (version A of the continuity of care question) that were cognitively tested but ultimately excluded from the final version of the 2018 questionnaire.

Version A continuity of care question

Version A tested well generally during cognitive interviews, with participants understanding and answering with ease. However, one woman thought she had already been asked this question due to its similarity with question C13 in the labour and birth section of the questionnaire ("Had any of the midwives who cared for you been involved in your antenatal care?").

As described in <u>Section 2</u>, although this question tested well, it was rejected in favour of version B because of the potential for being confused with C13 and because it does not provide as much detail in its response options.

Additions to E4, E5, F14, and F15

Following round one of cognitive interviewing, there was evidence to suggest that some women were answering E3, E4, F16 and F17 in relation to private/volunteer care providers (for example, both online and offline support groups). Prior to the second round of cognitive interviewing, "NHS" was inserted into these questions in order to specify that they relate to the care and advice provided NHS health professionals specifically, as shown below.

Although the amended questions tested well during the second and third rounds of cognitive interviewing, NHS England ultimately did not feel comfortable with the additions, and they were not included in the final 2018 questionnaire. This was because the distinction between an NHS service and a non-NHS service may not be clear cut, as the NHS runs, supports and provides referrals to various maternity and feeding support groups. As such, women may not be aware whether their support group is run by the NHS or by a private/charity organisation. In addition, the changes would render the results of these questions non-comparable to previous years.

However, this issue should be revisited in future survey years to further clarify which services fall under the NHS and to ensure that comparability is not prioritised over accuracy of response data.

6 Changes to survey protocol and documents

Covering letters

Changes to the format and wording of the covering letters were made following the success of the revised covering letters trialled as part of the 2017 Community Mental Health Survey pilot study.

The amount of information was reduced and repetitious information was removed. Socionormative messaging and potentially motivating and empowering text were adopted. In addition, important information was highlighted in bold text, and coloured text was used for key messages. A more informal style of font was also used throughout.

To date, inclusion of a trust letterhead and signatory on the first reminder letter has been optional (though enquiries revealed that all contractors who worked with trusts on the 2017 survey had opted to include both items). In phase three of cognitive interviewing, respondents were asked what they thought about the absence of any trust logo and signatory on the first reminder letter. Of the women that were asked, all thought the letter could be improved with the inclusion of these items as they would offer more credibility to the survey, particularly if the first letter had been unread or forgotten about. Therefore, inclusion of a trust letterhead and signatory on the first reminder letter is required rather than optional in the 2018 survey.

Sample Declaration Form

In line with changes adopted for the 2017 iteration of the Inpatient Survey, the sample declaration form was altered to include free-text comment boxes. These boxes were included next to checklist items so that trusts can provide an explanation for why a check may not be applicable ('N/A').

A larger free-text comment box is also provided for trusts to highlight any changes at their trust which may affect comparability of their 2018 data to previous years. For example, a trust may have merged with another trust, resulting in a very different sample profile for 2018. This in turn may mean year-on-year comparability of results may not be possible.

Additionally, the Sample Declaration Form now requires trusts to enter the total number of deliveries that occurred in the sampling period, before any exclusions are applied. If there is a substantial difference between a trust's total deliveries and their sample size, this could potentially indicate that the trust has incorrectly excluded eligible women. In 2017 the Coordination Centre requested total deliveries figures from several trusts during sample checking, so it was decided that in 2018 it would be useful for all trusts to submit their total deliveries as part of the Sample Declaration Form.

Collectively, these changes are designed to reduce queries regarding trusts' sample data, in turn ensuring that samples are approved quickly and that mailings can then begin sooner.

Instruction manuals

It was felt that the instruction manuals (the survey handbook and sampling instructions) had become long and cumbersome for contractors and trusts. In order to address these problems, the instruction manuals underwent redevelopment for the 2017 Inpatient Survey.

The consultation process for developing these new manuals began in April 2017 at an away day with CQC and NHS trusts. Draft copies of the new instruction manuals were then drawn up based on these consultations. These draft copies were sent to CQC, trusts and contractors, who were again invited to provide feedback. Final versions were then agreed and were used successfully for Inpatients 2017. The new manuals, which are shorter and more user-friendly, are now being rolled out across all surveys including Maternity 2018.
