



About the survey



45,455 invited to take part and 23,479 responses received. The Maternity Survey provides valuable data on mothers experiences across demographic groups, including different long-term conditions, ethnicities, ages and parity.



Ipsos MORI

The 2021 survey saw a turnaround in the downward response rate trend and achieved a response rate of 52%. It is very likely that the switch to a mixed methods approach has had an impact on improving response rates. In 2021, 89% of responses were completed online, versus 11% on paper.
